
We're Back

How to Participate in a Zoom Meeting Using the "Attendee Controls"

About

When you join a Zoom meeting hosted by another user, you are considered an attendee. The user who scheduled the meeting or was selected as the alternative host (if the host is unable to join) will have host controls, including muting audio, using video, sharing your screen and more.




Join a Meeting

Join a meeting by clicking on a Zoom link provided by the meeting host => follow the prompts to download and run Zoom => enter the meeting ID if prompted => click to join the audio conference. When you're in the meeting, you may click on the Start Video button to start your video.


Mute/Unmute & Audio Settings

You can mute and unmute your microphone. The host also has the ability to mute you. If you click on the arrow next to the mute button, you will have additional options for audio settings. You can change your microphone, leave the computer audio or access the audio options.




Start/Stop Video & Video Settings

You can turn your camera on or off with the Start/Stop Video button. By clicking on the arrow next to the start/stop video button, you can change webcams, access your Zoom video settings, or select a virtual background (if enabled).





Click on the invite button to invite other participants to the meeting.



- Invite by email: This will open up the selected email application with a copy of the meeting invitation
- Invite by Contacts: Invite users from your contacts list
- Invite Zoom Rooms: Invite Zoom Rooms listed on your account
- Invite by Phone: Available if the host has this option available.
- <u>Invite by a Room System</u>: If the host has cloud recording connector available for this
 meeting.



Participants

If you click on Participants, you can see who is currently in the meeting. The participants list also gives you the option to raise your hand or rename yourself.

- Raise Hand notifies host and shows a prompt to simulate hand raise
- Rename hover over your name to change it as it is seen in the participants list and video window



Share Screen

If the host allows, you can share your screen in the meeting. The host will have the ability to stop your screen share.



Chat

Chat with individuals or everyone in the meeting. Click Chat to open up the chat window and chat with other participants or view chat messages. Select the drop down next to To: to change who you are chatting with.



Record (if host has given permission)

The host will need to give you permission to record the meeting. If you try to click on this before the host has given permission, you will receive the following message.



Note: the host is not notified that you have requested recording permission. You will need to ask them through the chat or audio to give you recording permission (available in their Manage Participants list).


Choose video layout

At the upper right of the Zoom window, you can switch between active speaker view and gallery view. You can also switch between a shared screen and the video by clicking on a button available in this location during a screen share.



Enter/Exit Full Screen

At the top right of the Zoom window, you can enter or exit full screen mode. You can also exit full screen by clicking Esc.




Pin video

Pin video makes a user the primary speaker for you, instead of switching between the active speaker video. You can pin a video by right-clicking on the video of the person you want to pin or double click on their video window.

Co-annotate on screen share

If the host allows, you can annotate on their shared screen or share whiteboard. To do this, click on View Options at the top of your screen and choose Annotate.





Leave Meeting

You can leave the meeting at any time by clicking on the Leave Meeting option at the lower right corner of the Zoom window.

Monanthes - Miniature Jewels Among the Crassulaceae

The family of the Crassulaceae is home to many of the plants we admire at shows, collect in our greenhouses, and plant in our gardens. These include, for example, tylecodons, aeoniums, sedums, sempervivums, and echeverias among its three dozen genera and roughly 1400 species.

One of the lesser known genera in the Crassulaceae is the genus of Monanthes. Monanthes are endemic to islands in the Atlantic Ocean off the coast of Africa and Europe that are part of Macaronesia.

In May last year I showed pictures of various Monanthes in habitat on the islands of Tenerife and Lanzarote during my talk on the flora of the Canary Islands. In the following I am showing pictures taken in our backyard in Livermore, where we are currently growing five species/subspecies of Monanthes.

Although our rainfall pattern is very similar to that of the Canary Islands, Livermore's temperatures are much more extreme, and one has to take care to keep the plants from frying in the hot summer sun and from freezing in the winter. This means that in the summer I keep the plants on the northside of the house or hidden under my setup tables. Even then one has to be very careful about the few hours of sun that might reach the plants in the late afternoon when the sun sets to the north. It also means that one has to protect the plants from frost in the winter.



The first picture shows M. polyphylla ssp. polyphylla. It is the species I have encountered most often in the trade. Although each rosette is small, perhaps the size of a dime, it offsets freely, and after one or two seasons the plant fills the pot. The plant in the picture is a native of the island of La Palma, where we have seen it grow on sheer rock walls near the ocean and in sheltered pockets on rocky cliffs in the interior of the island. It also occurs on Tenerife and Gran Canaria. Subspecies amydros occurs on La Gomera.

Picture 2 shows M. pallens, which we have found on Tenerife growing on sheer rock walls in locations that were kept moist by seeps. The plants develop runner-like offsets, which can be seen in the picture at noon and 1 o'clock. This is very similar to how sempervivums spread, which are also members of the Crassulaceae family. The body of a fully grown M. pallens is in size similar to M. polyphylla, roughly the size of a dime.

I keep my plants hydrated. This means that the moss that sprouts in the winter stays green even in the summer and has filled the pot. This does not seem to harm M. pallens, which grows on top of the moss. In fact, several new plants have sprouted within the moss. These are from seedlings that use the moss as a nursery plant.



The flowers of M. pallens are shown in Picture 3. M. pallens appears to be self-fertile because all seedlings came from a single plant.



Picture 4 shows M. muralis, which is native of La Palma and which can also be found on La Gomera. Typical plants range in size from a dime to a quarter.

A closeup of its flower is shown in Picture 5. Again, this species grows on shaded rocks in habitat. But unlike M. pallens it seems to withstand prolonged drought. The plant reminds me of some of my sedum species, which is not to surprising, as sedums are also members of the Crassulaceae family.

The morphology of Monanthes laxiflora reminds me very much of that of another genus of the Crassulaceae family: Adromischus. Especially A. marianae and A. alveolatus come to mind. Plants of M. laxiflora grow a lot larger than any of the species discussed above, and individual leaves of M. laxiflora are similar in size to Adromischus leaves. Moreover, M. laxiflora may attain a height of several inches.

We have two varieties of M. laxiflora in our collection. Picture 6 shows M. laxiflora v. chlorotica from Tenerife. A closeup of its flower is shown in Picture 7. Picture 8 shows M. laxiflora v. microbotrys from Lanzarote and Fuerteventura. A closeup of its flower is shown in Picture 9. As the pictures show, the leaves and growth habits can fool you into believing the plants are one of the Adromischus species. But the flowers reveal their true association with the genus Monanthes.

In nature, we found M. laxiflora growing in rock crevices on cliffs. On Tenerife the plants were in the open and received at least partial sun. On Lanzarote and Fuerteventura we saw most plants hiding in shaded crevices or shaded by trees.
