Dear fellow succulent lovers and MBACSS members,

My collection has mostly soft succulents rather than cacti (which often have large spectacular flowers).

I'm looking forward to our June in-person Membership meeting (June 18) because our speaker this month is our fellow society and board member, Jorge Quinonez, who will tell us about Succulent Terrestrial Bromeliads. I don't think I know anything about that category of succulents, so I anticipate learning something new. The Mini-Show will feature Gymnocalycium in the cactus category and Mesembs like Lithops, Conophytum, etc. in the succulent category. Please bring your favorite plants in these categories to share with your fellow members who will vote which plants they like best. The winners receive raffle tickets as prizes. It's a really fun way to learn more about these kinds of plants.

I hope you are doing well in this weird weather regardless. I'm sure it will be very hot soon enough. See you at the Grange Hall on the 18th.

#### May 3, 2023

Call to Order: Mary Cross.

Minutes of April 5, 2022: Mary Cross. Accepted with one correction.

Treasurer's Report: Lou Falek. Report accepted as presented. Lou was commended for his complete and thorough report. Net profit from the Spring Show is \$1,120. Procedures for handling cash, memberships, and purchasing purple ribbon prizes need to be tighter. Nancy and Lou will get together before the Fall Show to help effect this. Jorge will provide a form to future judges to help them pre- calculate mileage. Show judges' pay will be capped at \$250, the same as for speakers at General Meetings.

#### Chairpersons' Reports:

Membership: Lyn MacDonald. Report accepted as presented. Board agreed that a membership directory will be printed (after April, when many renew); Nancy will print half as many as last year, about 50 copies. We will provide member name, year they joined, email, phone #, and the city in which they live.

Program: Jorge Quiñonez. May speaker is Brian Kemble of Ruth Bancroft Gardens. Plants for the regular and premium raffle will be provided by Gary Stubblefield. Mini-show featured plants are Astrophytum and Sansevieria. Arnie and Jorge will remind Gary and Ellen about bringing the plants. Jorge will send Brian's bio to Nancy for the newsletter. Jorge sent out a program update to all, through year end.

Sunshine Committee: Mary Cross. No updates from Cheryl

Spring Show & Sale: All. Mary apologized to Nancy and Dave for not ensuring that the wooden tables were placed in the correct way in storage. They had to move the tables at the end of the event. We will not use the wooden tables again as they are falling apart. Mary will ask for a second person to accept the key, with her, to also ensure that everything is returned to its exact place for Celeste.

Vendors: Peter. Vendors used less table space than planned. We had too much sales space for the numbers of customers who attended. We cannot expand the numbers of vendors without attracting more people to the Sale. David and Peter began discussion about a small vendor table and Peter explained how the smaller vendors handle pricing their plants. This is another potential membership perk, and a different kind of way to participate in the Sale. Mary will add this idea for discussion at the next Board meeting. Publicity: All. Seemed to be better this time. Facebook ads targeted people looking at gardens, and older people. No one knew whether the ads were cost effective.

A number of people attended the Sale thanks to Tom's column and radio interview.

Our sandwich board sign was destroyed when someone knocked into a pole. Lyn is willing to create something taller and more visible, with a name and address.

Arnie put up about 15 signs & posters in Aptos. Some attendees mentioned seeing something in the La Selva library. Board agreed that we should place more emphasis on this for future shows.

Mary will connect with the Master Gardener's Group and other gardening groups. The CSSA Calendar of Events did not note our sale, though Jorge had contacted them. We will continue to notify all five or so local cactus & succulent clubs, as well as notify radio and tv for publicity on their community calendars.

<u>Food:</u> Mary and Meryl. Too much food at previous sale, too little for this sale. Kudos to Abby Blair for handling Sunday lunch. Next time, Mary will assign different people to handle different meals. Arnie noted that Driscoll will provide a couple of cases of berries as a healthy snack for the fall show. People felt that the pizza was smaller, less tasty, and had less topping than last year, even though it came from the same restaurant.

CSSA & Affiliates: Jorge Quiñonez. The Board received an email copy of the current "To the Point" newsletter, which reprints articles from other clubs and is very informative. This year's conference is in July.

Library: Jonelle Verdugo and David Kurtz. Discussion about buying new books and the current lack of room. A method for culling and keeping was agreed upon; we will sort based on how often a book has been checked out and yet keep it based upon the book's value. Arnie agreed to keep some books as we decide what to do with them. Meryl volunteered to be the third librarian, for now.

Old Business: All. The discussion on changing the time of the Board Meetings will be deferred until next month.

# **Cactus** -- Gymnocalycium









**Gymnocalycium**, commonly called chin cactus, is a genus of about 70 South American species of cactus. The genus name Gymnocalycium (from Greek, "naked calyx") refers to the flower buds bearing no hair or spines. Their main area of distribution is Argentina, part of Uruguay, Paraguay, southern Bolivia and part of Brazil. Most species are rather small varying from 4 to 15 centimetres in size. In cultivation they are popular for their easy flowering habits, and the flowers are generally brightly coloured. Where temperatures fall below 10 °C (50 °F) they must be cultivated under glass with heat. (Wilipedia)

The **Aizoaceae**, or fig-marigold family, is a large family of dicotyledonous flowering plants containing 135 genera and about 1800 species. They are commonly known as ice plants or carpet weeds. They are often called vygies in South Africa and New Zealand. Highly succulent species that resemble stones are sometimes called mesembs. (Wilipedia)
