MARCH MEETING

March 17, 2024

Grit Dwellers, Quartzfields and Kokerbooms: Succulent Plants of the Western Cape

At the March 17th meeting Fred Dortort will be presenting a guided photographic tour of some of the plants he saw on his recent trip to South Africa.

Fred is the author of *The Timber Press Guide to Succulent Plants of the World* as well as numerous articles for the Cactus and Succulent Journal. He's made many trips to South Africa looking for and photographing unusual, spectacular, and increasingly, endangered succulent plants. For this presentation he'll be focusing on plants from the Western Cape regions of the country, covering the Little (Klein) Karoo, the Tankwa Karoo, parts of Namakwaland and the Knerverslakte quartzfields, along with some other adjacent, succulent-rich areas. Many of the succulents that grow here specialize in very odd habitats, some of which extend for miles and others for only a few square feet. This last trip, in April and May, came towards the end of the dry



season, for most of this vast area is in the winter rainfall zone. Many succulents are huddled down or even pulled underground at this time, but many of them also have decided on this time of year as their flowering season. The "tour" is also going to feature a number of photos from earlier trips, made in the South African winter and early spring, when some of the same plants are at their growing peak. The contrast may be quite enlightening for those of us who strive to grow some of these choice, often dwarf, species. Over the past twenty-plus years Fred has had the opportunity to visit some rarely travelled regions, in the company of several highly knowledgeable people, and he is looking forward to sharing some of the sights and plants he's seen with other succulent enthusiasts.







EDUCATIONAL STUFF

Beginner's Guide to: Clustering Mammillaria

Mammillaria is one of the larger genera in the Cactus family, and one of the most variable, with some members remaining as solitary columns for their entire lives, some remaining as fingernail size solitary globulars, some clumped and heavily spined with hooks, straight sharp spines, or feathery soft spines. The genus has been separated into series of genetically related but unsettled groups of plants but most of the series have clustering species.

The secrets to good growth are a continued supply of fertilizer during the growing season, strong light, and maintenance of a clean and insect free growing environment. The white and densely spined species want full sun and do best in a pot unprotected (except from prolonged heavy rain) all year long. Mammillaria grow well in a variety of potting mixes. Equally good plants have been grown in everything from commercial cactus potting mixes to completely inorganic mixes nearly pure pumice. Most have fairly short root systems and they do best in shallow pots. Deep pots with an organic potting mix can hold too much water and encourage rot.



Mammillaria have relatively short dormancies and will grow when the weather is warm. When the weather warms the plants need to be fed regularly. Early growth can often be seen in March and plants will still be growing into November. To preserve a robust

and uniform plant appearance, early spring and late fall growth should be allowed to proceed with minimal fertilizer. In warmer regions many Mammillaria can be grown in the ground. They make great additions to any succulent garden.



The appearance of white mealy bug egg cases (M.'s worst enemy) on the tips of the spines or the appearance of ants means that mealy bugs are sucking the sap and life out of the plant. Immediate treatment is required with thorough washing and spraying with an insecticide.

Propagation of M. clusters is easy. Cuttings can be taken at any time during the growing season (April to early November). Let them dry for a few days and replant in clean potting mix (pure pumice is even better). Rooting is rapid with short white roots generally appearing after a couple of weeks. Also, they are one of the easiest species to grow from seed. Simply place seeds on top of damp potting mix, covered with a light coating of gravel and placed in a plastic bag in bright light (but out of direct sun). Germination usually occurs in a week or 10 days. The seedlings can stay in the plastic bag for several weeks util they get large

enough to survive unprotected. Then they should be removed to a still shaded but brighter and drier environment. Show quality plants can often be grown from seed in just 4 or 5 years. Best results are obtained when the seeds are started in late March or late May.
